The studies of secular lordship, spiritual lordship, heresy, and millennialism often do not overlap. Scholars have linked popular heresy with millennialism, or have studied heresy in contrast to orthodox spiritual lordship. Plenty has been written about the continuing crisis between church and state during the medieval period.<sup>3</sup>
